

AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE CONDUCTING OF PUBLIC DANCES ON SUNDAYS, DEFINING PUBLIC DANCES AND DANCE HALLS AND PROVIDING PENALTIES.

SECTION 1. BE IT ORDAINED AND ENACTED by the Burgess and Council of the Borough of Monroeville, in Council assembled, and it is hereby ordained and enacted by the authority of the same, that on and after the effective date of this ordinance, no person or corporation shall operate a Dance Hall or conduct a Public Dance on the first day of the week, commonly called Sunday.

SECTION 2. The term, "public dance", as used in this article, shall be taken to include any dance or ball to which admission may be had by the payment of a fee or by the purchase, possession, or presentation of a ticket or token, or in connection with which a charge is made for care of clothing or other property, or any dance to which the public generally may gain admission with or without the payment of a fee.

The term "dance hall", as used in this article, shall be taken to include any room, place or space, in which a public dance as herein defined is held.

SECTION 3. The provisions of this Ordinance shall not apply to fraternal societies or organizations at a hall or in a building within the Borough used exclusively by such fraternal society or organization.

SECTION 4. Any person or corporation who shall violate any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof before the Burgess or a Justice of the Peace, be fined the sum of Twenty Five (\$25.00) Dollars, or ten (10) days in the County Jail and the costs of prosecution.

SECTION 5. That any ordinance or part of an ordinance conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance be and the same is hereby repealed.
